On August 17, 2020, Governor Reynolds received a Presidential Disaster Declaration designating 16 counties in the state of Iowa for Public Assistance.

This declaration initiates availability of federal funding to assist the designated counties in emergency work and repair or replacement of disaster-damaged facilities.

On August 20, 2020, Governor Reynolds received an amendment to the declaration to include one county for Individual Assistance.

This amendment initiates availability of federal funding to assist individuals and households in the designated county.

Local Governments:

- Counties and parishes
- Municipalities, cities, towns, boroughs, and townships
- Local public authorities
- School districts
- Intrastate districts
- Councils of governments
- Regional and interstate government entities
- Agencies or instrumentalities of local governments
- Special districts established under State law
- State recognized Indian tribes

Federally recognized Indian tribal governments

Private Nonprofit Organizations:

To be an eligible PNP, the PNP must show that it:

- Has a ruling letter from the U.S. Internal Revenue Service
- Has documentation from the State substantiating it is a non-revenue producing, nonprofit entity organized or doing business under State law.
- Owns or operates an eligible facility. An eligible facility is one that provides a critical service (education, utility, emergency, or medical) or a facility that provides non critical but essential social services and provides those services to the general public.
