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## Coordinating Infrastructure Assessment is Key to Federal, State Ag Preparedness

State and federal partners recently met to discuss infrastructure assessment and the key role it plays in agriculture preparedness.

Assessing infrastructure in the food/agriculture sector presents unique challenges. Production agriculture is a network of systems while post-harvest manufacturing can usually be analyzed using "bricks and mortar" tools. The challenge is to work with

industry in a secure, trusted relationship to gather data and provide value to industry with the result of improving overall security and preparedness.

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## Tri-State Group Holds COML Training

Members of a tri-state group focused on improving cross-border communications recently had an opportunity to become more familiar with their critical incident roles and responsibilities.

Members of the Iowa/Minnesota/Wisconsin Tri-State Group gathered in Dubuque Jan. 10-13 for Communications Leader (COML) Training. The training, sponsored by HSEMD and the Iowa Statewide Interoperable Communications System Board, provided National Incident Management System (NIMS) compliant instruction to ensure that trained personnel are capable of coordinating on-scene emergency communications during a multi-jurisdictional response.

The training was the result of a December 2010 Tri-State Communications tabletop exercise held in La Crosse, Wis. An after-action report from the exercise recommended COML training as a corrective action, along with holding a full-scale exercise to enhance the tri-state region's ability to respond to and recover from all-hazards events. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security has provided assistance in holding the full-scale exercise, which is scheduled for March 1, 2012.

# Coordination Plays Key Role in Ag Preparedness

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to get useable infrastructure data boils down to measuring resiliency: the ability of a business to resume operations after a contamination or disease incident interrupts production.

Georgia's Protective Security Advisor (PSA) Jim Hardy described a comprehensive dashboard that includes a resiliency index. The readout shows an industry how its risk can be improved by taking certain protective or mitigation measures. Both federal PSAs and state food/agriculture planners work with industry using various tools to document and assess criticality and vulnerability.

"We nominate systems as Level 1 or Level 2 systems so industry can have the benefit of the analysis and a nexus of industry resilience," said Brigid Elchos, Mississippi state public health veterinarian.

"Having this knowledge raises all boats," added Maj. Gen. (ret) Greg Gardner, DHS Infrastructure protection regional supervisor.

In Iowa, PSA Phil Pitzen works with major infrastructure assets and the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship, along with other agencies and industry leaders, to assess production systems.

Data from these assessments is federally protected but the process helps inform both security and industry leaders as to what steps may be taken to improve overall resiliency.

Also at last week's meeting, members from the Multi-State Partnership and Southern Agriculture and Animal Disaster Response Alliance (SAADRA) discussed regional preparedness and capabilities, joint training and exercises, and how the two groups can work together.

States also learned about the revised national food response template, progress in secure product

Agriculture which is comprised of agriculture, homeland security, and emergency management officials from 14 states. HSEMD coordinates Partnership projects and meetings with the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship and the Food Safety Bureau in the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals. HSEMD works in close collaboration with partner states on issues that cross state lines.

If disaster strikes your place of business, how will you continue the most essential functions and services you provide? If you have

to operate out of another facility, will you have access to all the essential records and resources that you will need? Do you even know what they are?

This workshop will help participants find the answers to these questions. Participants will discover the elements needed to ensure continuity of operations (COOP) and continuity of government (COG) under all circumstances, with a special focus on ensuring that essential records are preserved and available. Workshop participants will learn to identify what records are essential and how to protect them. Risks and hazards will be identified and evaluated. Participants will learn mitigation strategies to ensure the availability of essential records and other resources necessary to continue operations even in the face of disaster. By the end of the training, participants will have a clear understanding of what should be in their COOP/COG plan and even have a start on the plan.

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## 2012 Session Legislative Update

Things at the Capitol are now in full swing for the year. While much of the public discussion has focused on property taxes, there are several bills that are of interest to the homeland security and emergency management community.

From last year, **Senate File (SF) 413**, dealing with local emergency management funding, continues to be discussed in the House of Representatives. Also, **Senate Study Bill (SSB) 3130**, which is a new version of last year's **SF 532** seeking to create a hazard mitigation project fund with funds derived from tax increments, has just arrived in the Senate.

Other bills of interest include:

- **SSB 3088** would convert HSEMD from a division to a stand-alone department;
- **SF 2011** would place a member of local emergency management on the Statewide Interoperable Communications Systems Board;
- **SF 2002** would provide funds for the restoration of the Lake Delhi dam;
- **HF 2009** seeks to make changes to the State Individual Assistance Program.

With the General Assembly indicating they would like to finish their work in early April, it certainly will make for an interesting spring.
